



The Keynote Speakers

Our 46th annual conference has five keynote speakers, two on the first day of the conference and three on the second.

MONDAY 27 NOVEMBER 2023

FIRST KEYNOTE ADDRESS, 10:00AM PROFESSOR LARS COENEN (WESTERN NORWAY UNIVERSITY OF APPLIED SCIENCES)



Lars Coenen is Professor in Innovation and Sustainability Transitions at the Mohn Centre for Innovation and Regional Development at Western Norway University of Applied Sciences in Bergen. Previously, Lars was full professor at CIRCLE, the Centre for Innovation Research at Lund University. From 2017-2020 he has been the inaugural 'City of Melbourne Chair of Resilient Cities', at the Melbourne Sustainable Society Institute of the University of Melbourne, Australia. Currently he also holds an honorary professorial position at the Melbourne Centre for

Cities (UoM). Lars is an economic geographer and scholar in innovation studies. He is well-known internationally for his work on regional and urban innovation and, in particular, his pioneering research on the geography of environmental innovation and sustainability transitions. He is author of more than 60 scientific papers published in leading international journals such as Research Policy, Regional Studies and Economic Geography, co-edited the book 'Urban Sustainability Transitions', and acts as Associate Editor for the journal Environmental Innovation and Societal Transitions. Most of his research has been supported through competitive grants, financed e.g. by JPI Urban Europe, Horizon Europe, the Swedish Energy Agency and the Norwegian Research Council.

SECOND KEYNOTE ADDRESS, 5:15PM PROFESSOR MICHAELA TRIPPL (UNIVERSITY OF VIENNA)

Michaela Trippl is a Professor of Economic Geography at the University of Vienna (Austria) and holds the position of Professor II at the University of Agder (Norway). Since 2022, she has been serving as the Vice Dean for Research and Internationalisation within her faculty in Vienna, and she has been a Member of the Board of the Austrian Science Fund since 2021. She was elected Fellow of the British Academy of Social Sciences (FAcSS) and Fellow of the Regional Studies Association (FeRSA) in 2021. Michaela's research



primarily centres on the geography of innovation and sustainability transitions, challenge-oriented innovation systems, green path development, and place-based transformative innovation and industrial policies. She has published numerous articles in major journals such as Progress in Human Geography, Economic Geography, Environment and Planning A and Regional Studies, three books and numerous book chapters. She has also co-edited two books and six special issues of international leading journals.

THIRD KEYNOTE ADDRESS, 9:00AM PROFESSOR PAUL DALZIEL (LINCOLN UNIVERSITY)



Paul Dalziel has been Professor of Economics at Lincoln University, New Zealand, since 2002. He is currently Director of the Agribusiness and Economics Research Unit at that university, along with Distinguished Professor Caroline Saunders. In 2018, Palgrave Macmillan published their open access book, *Wellbeing Economics: The Capabilities Approach to Prosperity*, which has recorded more than 96,000 accesses. Paul is also New Zealand Lead for the European Union's International Urban and Regional Cooperation (IURC) programme and a member of the leadership team for the Wellbeing Economy Alliance (WEAII) Aotearoa hub.

FOURTH KEYNOTE ADDRESS, 9:45AM M. MARGARITIS SCHINAS (EUROPEAN COMMISSION, VICE PRESIDENT)

Margaritis Schinas (1962, GR) holds an MSc on Public Administration and Public Policy from the London School of Economics, a Diploma of Advanced European Studies on European Administrative Studies from the College of Europe in Bruges and a Degree in Law from the Aristotelean University of Thessaloniki. Mr. Schinas has worked for the European Commission since 1990 in various positions of



responsibility mainly in the private offices of Commissioners. Mr. Schinas was elected Member of the European Parliament in September 2007. Upon the completion of his parliamentary term of office, Mr. Schinas returned to the Commission and as of February 2010 was appointed by President Barroso as Deputy Head of the Bureau of European Policy Advisers. Mr. Schinas later served as Resident Director and Head of the Athens Office of DG ECFIN. As of 1.11.2014, President Juncker appointed Mr. Schinas as Chief European Commission Spokesperson.

FIFTH KEYNOTE ADDRESS, 1:30PM DR CHLOE WARD (VICTORIAN DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY, ENVIRONMENT AND CLIMATE ACTION)



Dr Chloe Ward trained as a historian, and now works in economic development policy and sustainability transitions for the Victorian Government, currently as A/Director, Industry and Community Strategy in the Victorian Forestry Transition Program, delivered by the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action. Her research interests include 20th century British history, and the intersection between culture and politics. She is a former Research Fellow in the EU
